AYLESFORD PARISH REPORT FOR OCT21 AYLESFORD, ECCLES, BLUEBELL HILL, WALDERSLADE

Criminal damage-Sainsburys petrol station, Aylesford

A female driver was filling up petrol when another vehicle drove into the side of her smashing her wing mirror. The driver was also quite verbal to the female. CCTV available.

Theft-Hermes parcelnet limited, Aylesford.

WINTER SECURITY

As we brave another winter I would like to remind all residents to be aware of making sure there security is up to date and working. Make sure if you have a mobile phone or you have bought one recently, it is security marked. Local officers for your area will be more than happy to give advice on protecting your valuables. House security is very important if you go away over Christmas. If you get on with your neighbour, leave them a contact number in case you are away for a while. A lot of people have looked out for their neighbours and it has proven to be effective in deterring thieves.

Where possible park your vehicle on a drive and keep security lights on at night. If you have a garage, park the vehicle right up against the door so that it cannot be opened. Many people store Christmas food and drinks in their garage so be cautious.

Report anyone or anything suspicious in the area giving as much detail as possible as this can be followed up quicker. Check on an elderly neighbour and see how they are over the festive period. People sometimes think they are bothering the police, but if something is not right in your area that needs police attention, the number to call is 101 or emergency 999.
